Long Island City, NY (March 7, 2019) – Later this month, LPAC proudly presents the 6th annual Rough Draft Festival. The festival, which was created by Associate Director and Festival Curator Handan Ozbilgin, is a celebration of meaningful work under development by a wide array of talented artists and organizations. Each year Ozbilgin seeks out exciting and impactful projects and provides these fresh voices with stipends and space to further develop their workin-progress, which are tantamount to finished products; all while providing the audience window into the creative process.



By providing these plays, that have previously had readings and workshops, this opportunity, Rough Draft is giving artists the chance to rework and further develop their pieces, and also allows them to have their work be seen again. The Rough Draft team is pleased to have been part of the growth of productions like **Kyoung Park's** PILLOW TALK, **Radical Revolution's** SONGS ABOUT TRAINS and **Leila Buck** and **Tamilla Woodard's** AMERICAN DREAMS.

This year's plays offer a wide range of themes told by diverse voices. HOW TO MOURN AN AMERICAN (AN INSTRUCTIONAL) by Cherrye Davis is a dive through America's history and complicated relationship with loss allowing the audience to deeply consider what it takes to truly heal, as individuals, as community, as a nation. Nathan Yungerberg's MOTHER OF PEARL tell the story of the surviving members of a horrific tragedy thirty years ago that turned jubilation into sorrow and friends into foes when they convene where many of their most cherished memories and worst nightmares were born. ABOUT LAGUARDIA PERFORMING ARTS CENTER

LPAC is a cultural "bridge" and integral part of LaGuardia Community College, located in the most culturally diverse urban area in the world, Queens, NY. LPAC has a long and respected history of engaging, presenting, and producing new artistic work by diverse, international artists. The organization has evolved into a destination for high quality theatre, dance, and performing arts from emerging artists who are transforming the international arts community. For example, in 2012, LPAC presented the New York theatre premiere of "For Rent", by acclaimed Turkish playwright Ozen Yula, a work that was banned in Turkey and which was translated into English for its LPAC run. LPAC recently completed its pilot Rough Draft Festival, a showcase of compelling new artistic work-in-process by LPAC and other companies. The Rough Draft Festival's ongoing activities are being informed by a cultural exchange with Turkish Theatre Company VDST's New Text New Theatre Project.

Founded in 1980, LaGuardia Performing Arts Center's (LPAC) mission is to present artistically engaging, culturally diverse programming for its surrounding community. The organization has a mandate to advocate for and to promote a wide variety of diverse stories told by under-recognized artists in productions of the highest quality. LPAC is the largest theater complex in Western Queens, and with an audience hailing from 180 different countries that collectively speaks 119 different languages, LPAC plays a key role as a cultural "bridge" presenting and producing artistically engaging, culturally relevant programming for an audience of over 40,000 people throughout LaGuardia Community College, Queens, and New York City.
