THE LEWIS PRIZE FOR MUSIC ANNOUNCES ITS 2022 ACCELERATOR AWARDS OF \$500,000 EACH

NEW YORK, NY – The Lewis Prize for Music – a philanthropic music arts organization advancing systems change through Creative Youth Development (CYD) – has announced its 2022 Accelerator Awards recipients. Over \$2 million in funding will give young people access to music education, strengthen the well-being of their communities, and put music at the center of efforts to establish equity.

Founded in 2018 by philanthropist **Daniel R. Lewis**, The Lewis Prize for Music believes young people with access to high-quality music learning, performance, and creation opportunities will mature into thriving individuals. Inequitable systems often fail to prioritize music learning in young people's lives. As a result, too many young people are not supported to express themselves creatively. This stifles young people's potential to become powerful citizens, who through musical pursuits learn to contribute positively to their communities. By supporting music leaders across the country to continue their great work, The Lewis Prize for Music seeks to inspire others to ensure every young person has the opportunity to access transformative music learning, performance, and creation that benefits them and their communities.

"I continue to be inspired by and grateful for the work of leaders and organizations that invest in creative youth development (CYD) to improve self-expression; academic, social-emotional and employment outcomes for young people," says Daniel R. Lewis, Founder, and Chairman of The Lewis Prize for Music.

"The Lewis Prize for Music's chosen path to the equitable systems change needed to guarantee all youth thrive, as is demonstrated by the 2022 Accelerator Awardees, is through collaboration among CYD organizations, community partners, schools, universities, funders, and government."

The annual Accelerator Awards are part of The Lewis Prize for Music's \$20 million commitment over five years for creative youth development organizations across the country creating positive change through youth music programs. Previous awardees have used the Accelerator Awards funding to expand their program offerings, hire additional staff, provide training and mentorship, and establish youth music and technology centers for their communities.

"Our 2022 Accelerator Awardees, and countless creative youth development organizations across the country, are creating spaces for young people to develop artistry and leadership that strengthens themselves and their communities," says **Dalouge Smith**, CEO of The Lewis Prize for Music. "Despite the trials of COVID and longstanding racial inequities, our awardees show us that building trusted relationships through music with young people gives them the confidence and tools to pursue the full lives they deserve. We look forward to our new partnership with these awardees who have proven, before and during the pandemic, the necessity of providing equitable access to music opportunities and direct service supports for young people."


Accelerator Awardees – \$500,000 each

We Are Culture Creators, Detroit, MI

CREATORS

We Are Culture Creators is a media arts collective and label featuring some of Detroit's best emerging young talent. The organization is composed of musicians, photographers, filmmakers, producers, and like-minded creatives.

Michael Reyes and Elizabeth Stone, the Founders of We Are Culture Creators, started with a simple thought to provide a loving and encouraging space for up-and-coming youth hip hop artists; fill that space with professional equipment and the necessary training to professionalize; make that space available at all hours of the day and night; and allow those young people to actualize their abilities, talents, goals, and dreams. They furthered that idea by providing workshops and practical training and discussions in financial literacy, artist management, community organizing, entrepreneurship, and business.

Since then, We Are Culture Creators has established itself as a growing and expanding program providing young people with opportunities in both the fields of business and community. Many We Are Culture Creators participants are becoming the next generation of Detroit entertainers and entrepreneurs.





The Heartbeat Music Project, Crownpoint, NM

The Heartbeat Music Project (HMP) offers music education for Navajo (Diné) K-12 students living on the Navajo Reservation, offering a safe space for students to thrive and gain confidence in themselves, their abilities, and their local and global potential.

Founded in 2016 by violinist Ariel Horowitz, teachings at The Heartbeat Music Project push back on settler colonialism, a system that devalues Indigenous music while elevating Western music genres. By offering Diné and Western music simultaneously, Heartbeat disrupts the colonial project and provides Diné youth equitable access to heretofore 'elitist' knowledge. Students engage in an organic confidence-building process in which they strengthen and give voice to their own culture and reimagine Western music genres, creating emergent artistic traditions that help shape postcolonial local and global musical cultures and are sustained within the greater Navajo community.

The Heartbeat Music Project is a success story when it comes to creating atmospheres of cultural exchanges that acknowledge the impact of past and present colonialism on indigenous peoples, respectfully engaging with Diné music, cultures, and customs.



RYSE Youth Center, Richmond, CA

RYSE creates safe spaces grounded in social justice that build youth power for young people to love, learn, educate, heal and transform lives and communities. RYSE is committed to keeping youth strong, safe, healthy, and in a united community where they can have the opportunity to lead, dream, and love.



RYSE envisions a community that inspires youth to live with pride and purpose, where the sounds of gunshots have been replaced by the sounds of organizing, song, collaboration, laughter, and learning.







INTEMPO, Stamford, CT

INTEMPO offers children the opportunity to express themselves artistically through traditional and classical music and instrumentation. The organization is committed to connecting the dots between intercultural music education and its influence on the socio-emotional and intellectual development of children.

They offer a repertoire that reflects the diversity of their students' cultures and communities. Through the joy of making music together, INTEMPO has broadened children's understanding of the world and helped build skills that will serve them well in every aspect of their lives.

In 2009, violinist Angelica Durrell met MacArthur Fellow Aaron Dworkin, who encouraged her to create a path to achieving greater diversity and inclusion in music. Two years later, motivated by her own story of struggling as an immigrant student from a single-parent household, she founded INTAKE Music, now known as INTEMPO.

Conceived as a much-needed bridge between the arts sector and marginalized immigrant communities, INTEMPO began with two teachers and 40 students from immigrant backgrounds. Since then, their staff of teaching artists has more than doubled, and the Music School and community outreach events have reached more than 1,625 students and 6,460 community members.
